

From the President...



Hi there fellow curlers

It is hard to believe it is February already and there are only 2 months of curling left. All of the Sections are functioning well and the ice is fantastic. We hosted a Senior Men's InterClub bonspiel last week, with teams coming from all over the region. Our guests gave nothing but rave reviews for the ice and for the food.

For the most part, the news remains good. The finances are great. The new roof has allowed us to cut our Hydro bill by almost 20%. That would normally show up dramatically on our bottom line. Unfortunately, we lost a 19% subsidy that we had during COVID. So we are basically breaking even on the Hydro, but it could have been a lot worse.

There are those who are wondering why the plastic has returned to Sheet 6. The present theory is that this dripping originates from the part of the roof that we didn't fix on the outside edges of the ice. The old insulation and poor vapour barrier continue to behave the way they have in the past. Fortunately, it is not really affecting the playing surface and there isn't nearly as much moisture as we have experienced in the past and it isn't happening as constantly. Those who know still don't see this as a major concern, so not to worry. The excellent news is that the new roof is working out really well. No problems whatsoever.

Earlier this week, when the prospect of US tariffs seemed imminent, it was suggested by some of our members that we should stop selling American made alcohol. Some products were put away and were not for sale on Monday and Tuesday night. Certainly, given the booing of the Star Spangled Banner at sporting events last weekend and government threats to retaliate by doing things like pulling all American alcohol products from the shelves of liquor stores across the country, patriotic Canadian determination to fight back was strong. Well the tariffs were postponed and so the American alcohol we normally sell is back on the shelf. We'll take a closer look at this issue at our next Board meeting and have a plan in place should the tariffs materialize at some point in the future.

I hope you all enjoy the last two months of the season. Try and make the most of them. The long hot summer is just around the corner.



The Peterborough High School Curling League has returned to the ice after a short break for exam season at the end of January. The regular season is coming to a close, with all teams having played each other once. The playoffs will begin on Feb 25th, where the top 4 boys and top 4 girls teams will face each other, eying for the title of city champions!



On the boys side, the St. Peter's #1 & #2 teams have dominated play, currently sitting in 1st & 2nd place, respectively. They are following by Holy Cross (3rd), Crestwood (4th), and Adam Scott (5th).

1st place on the girls side has been a very close battle all year long between Holy Cross, St. Peter's, and Crestwood. Currently, they are in a 3-way tie situation for 1st place. Did vou know...



The sport of curling is one of those unique sports (archery is another) where persons with a disability can compete and integrate fully with able-bodied players. Here are some points of etiquette that enhance the experience of playing against or with a person using a wheelchair.

W/C curlers fully expect and accept that their opponents are going to sweep their own rocks. W/C curlers train without sweeping so there is no need for ambulatory curlers to change their game.

The most significant rule of etiquette when playing an all wheelchair team is to not sweep their rocks behind the t-line, after all they don't (can't) sweep yours so it is a matter of fairness.

A team of curlers in wheelchairs have a practiced routine of bringing rocks up to the delivery spot and of holding each other's chairs as required. There is no need for opponents to do these duties.

If you are playing on an integrated team with a curler in a wheelchair it helps with the pace of play to bring their rock forward to a spot on the centre line approximately half way between the top of the house and the near hog line. This point is the same as the spot where the guard rock is placed in doubles play.

Also, particularly for takeouts, most wheelchairs need to be held to prevent them from sliding backwards on the side of the throwing arm. To prevent a wheelchair sliding backwards during delivery, wedge your foot or broom behind the wheel on the same side as the throwing arm and hold the seat back frame with both hands.

A good practice for anyone interacting with a person with a disability is to always ask "how can I help you" before pitching in to help.






Wednesday Open League...

Thursday Team entry have started the playoffs with the winner of A side being crowned Club Champion. I wish all teams good luck with the rest of the season! Jane










From our Ice Maker... Ryan's Rant Volume 2

Thanks to most of you who use the sticks and stabilizers. It's been much better, but I still believe the rest of you can do better. An additional point that I forgot to add was that there is a broom closet which you get the brooms from. The racks and shelves are for the sticks and stabilizers. Please put the brooms back in the broom closet so that there is room for all of the sticks. If you can take it from there, you can put it back to there. Especially the men who have to walk right back past the closet to the locker room.

On a new note, let's address the confusion as to when is a safe time to come onto the ice after preparation. I do not care if you are on a prepped sheet while I am still nipping another one. If you're the type that pays attention, and have seen your sheet pebbled and nipped, there is nothing left for me to do and it is yours to do with as you wish. If you are not the type that pays attention and only glances out the window from time to time, a good indication that your sheet is ready is if the numbers are off the board and the hacks are in place. The HACKS are the clearest sign. Pebbled. Nipped. Hacks in. Numbers down. All yours. You do not have to wait for me to finish nipping all six, and clean the nipper, and put it away, and walk off. If you are on the last sheet nipped. We clean the nipper behind the hacks, which are 6 feet from the back line, which is another 12 feet to the guard zone which means we are roughly 20 feet from where you plan to throw your rocks. If we can't prevent a rogue guard from crashing into the nipper while cleaning it, I feel like there's a bigger problem at hand. I'm not in your way and you're not in mine. So you do not have to wait to start while the nipper is being cleaned.

For those who feel that it's best for everyone to start at the same time out of fairness for the time clock, that no one should have the advantage of starting earlier or later. Consider that you also play on a different sheet from week to week and that it will be different people that have the... five minute time advantage. Why shouldn't the motivated have an advantage anyway?

If your sheet is ready, you're wasting time if you're not getting on it as soon as you can. I'm happy to see people motivated and anxious to get on the ice. Thank you, Joanna and other day ladies for understanding and practicing this already. And thank you to Brian for trying to pass this on as well.



Meet your Board... Torben Drewes, Membership Director



I started curling in 1967 when I was in Grade 9. The Port Arthur Curling Club had a very active high school program with two late afternoon leagues: boys and mixed. There were regular bonspiels with our cross town rivals at the Fort William club but we didn't stand much of a chance curling against people like Rick Lang. I stopped curling when I started university and, with the exception of a year in a Sunday social league for Queen's grad students, did not take up the game again until 1996. It was my good fortune to be taken on as a lead by Keith Harrison and with Ren Mann and Phil Chamberlain completing the foursome I could not have asked for a more accomplished or pleasant team to play with. When Keith retired, I joined Terry Goodwin and Ed Gilson to curl on Tuesday evenings and eventually Ed and I wound up in the Senior Men's league with Gord Schmidt and Don Jamieson. Before back issues made her quit curling, my wife Melinda and I curled a very enjoyable number of years in the Friday Evening Mixed league.

In the summer of 2021 I volunteered to join the Board as Membership Director. The Peterborough Curling Club had been a very important and valued part of my life for 25 years and it was my turn to contribute. To be honest, there is an occasional day when the job can be a bit of a pain but, on the whole, the benefits far outweigh the costs. There is a satisfaction and a greater sense of belonging that comes with taking on a governance role. Walking through the doors feels better somehow when one is contributing to the club. More importantly, being on the Board allows me to interact with more club members. I belong to the club not because of the game itself but because of the many people I am privileged to play the game with. As a Board member, I regularly talk to and work with members who I would not otherwise get to meet, from other Board members to office volunteers and to curlers at large.
